GOAL AREA 1: PARTNERSHIPS

We have seen renewed energy and investment in partnerships for FY18. New and old initiatives alike are benefitting from the strength of collaboration. Our work is driven, in large part, by the partners who help to make it happen.

In the midst of the many outstanding partners who are involved in the many dimensions of our work, we are extremely excited about new partnerships formed this year with the **VT9to26 Coalition**. This is a statewide action-oriented, cross-sector coalition working together to achieve positive outcomes for all youth ages 9-26 in Vermont. Partners include public and private organizations; state and local community leaders; those working with older youth; as well as youth and young adults themselves.

Drawing on inspiration from the VT Youth Declaration of Rights (see below), the VT9to26 Coalition is committed to helping Vermont youth find what they need to be the best versions of themselves.

GOAL AREA 2: QUALITY



HOW MUCH?

1,478 adults were trained in expanded learning best practices

122 afterschool professionals advanced their careers with credentials & higher education coursework

\$16,000 in grant funding were distributed to programs to increase quality and capacity

HOW WELL?

90% of professional development training participants agreed that they gained new knowledge

91% of training participants agreed that they would apply what they learned in their programs

104 21st Century Community Learning Center programs used the Youth Program Quality Assessment (YPQA) tool to improve program practice

IS ANYONE BETTER OFF?

93% of afterschool professionals who fully agreed that Vermont Afterschool helped them to do their jobs better

ELEVATING THE FIELD

LEAD

Our newly formed professional development program called L.E.A.D. (Leadership, Exploration, And Development) held four courses over the fall/spring. We've had 15 staff participating in the program, which provides an advanced level group of afterschool professionals with the tools to hone their strengths and develop new skills to assume greater leadership roles in the future.

SEL

This year we saw the Social Emotional Learning (SEL) Initiative continue to grow.

- 1,571 children grades K-6 served by programs in the SEL pilot
- 204 afterschool staff trained on trauma-informed care
- 14 afterschool program sites served by the communities of practice model providing dedicated coaching and consultation from our SEL Coordinator Sara Forward

STEM

A couple of initiatives stand out in our work around Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM).

- The STEM Pathways project, funded by the McClure Foundation, launched in five afterschool programs with the goal of train
 - ing high school students work-based learning skills to teach afterschool STEM content to elementary age youth.

The MedTrek project expanded to four afterschool programs sites (pictured above at Winooski) and fostered strong partnerships with regional health education centers. MedTrek is a 10-week afterschool program that brings together community partners and mentors to help middle school youth explore different health sciences careers.

APLS

Our hallmark Afterschool Professional Learning Strands (APLS) wrapped up another year with a total of 30 participants across the STEM, SEL, and Program Quality strands.

• 100% of APLS participants said that this year-long, in-depth professional development for afterschool directors and leaders would help them do their jobs better.



GOAL AREA 3: POLICY

As Vermont's leading voice for afterschool in Montpelier and Washington, D.C., we advocate for state and federal policy that promotes access, affordability, and sustainability of afterschool, summer learning, and out-of-school time programs.

For FY18, the Youth Declaration of Rights informed our policy work at the State House as well. The Vermont Child Poverty Council heard testimony on the Youth Declaration of Rights, which led to the Council naming afterschool funding as one of their top priorities for the 2018 legislative session. Rep. Diane Lanpher and Sen. Debbie Ingram, who are the Council's co-chairs, subsequently became solid champions of afterschool and summer learning.

MAJOR WINS FOR AFTERSCHOOL

STATE

In 2018, the Agency of Human Services received legislative approval to spend \$600,000 over three years to increase access to afterschool programs. The funding comes from a special allocation intended to boost Vermont's prevention efforts. This happened thanks for the hard work of our legislative champions and advocates. Years of work, in fact. But it has been the inspiration from Finland, attention around youth voice, testimony on social emotional learning, and the Department of Health partnership that has helped push the issue into a broader context of how to help all youth grow into happy and healthy Vermonters.

FEDERAL

Sen. Lisa Murkowski (pictured below standing in blue) led a bipartisan group of afterschool champions, including all three members of the Vermont delegation, to push for increased federal spending on afterschool. For FY18, Congress increased spending for 21st Century Community Learning Centers by \$20 million.





AFTERSCHOOL & SUMMER LEARNING DAY


Our annual Afterschool & Summer Learning Day went off without a hitch (no snowstorms!) on February 16, 2018. This event brings together program providers, partners, and advocates for a day of action at the State House. We welcomed Erik Peterson, Vice President for Policy at the Afterschool Alliance. Erik led a session for participants on federal policy implications for afterschool programs as well as testified in the House Education and Senate Education Committees on the federal funding outlook for afterschool for FY19.

Alongside the Afterschool & Summer Learning Day, we ran our annual **Afterschool Youth Ambassadors** program. In total, 71 youth ambassadors in grades 5-12 signed up, representing 17 towns across Vermont. During their morning workshop, Youth Ambassadors met Lt. Governor Zuckerman and engaged with him on a variety of issues and topics relevant to them. Youth Ambassadors then delivered copies of the VT Youth Declaration of Rights to legislators at the State House; and everyone was recognized in the House Chamber during a reading of the House Resolution on Afterschool.


FY2018 Total Expenditures:
