WE ARE SHAPING THE FUTURE OF VERMONT and that was never more evident than in the past 12 months.

All change begins within. For Vermont Afterschool, that came in the form of a half-year planning process to develop a multi-year strategic direction. With input from constituents, partners, staff, and board, we are now charged and ready to continue shaping the future.

At the state level, our vision for the future is a universal afterschool system that ensures every youth who wants to attend an afterschool and summer program in Vermont has the opportunity to do so. Thanks to the work of Vermont's afterschool champions, the Legislature created a special fund to invest in a mixed-delivery system of public, private, and nonprofit afterschool programs that makes this dreamed future a viable one.

Of course, universal afterschool doesn't work without high-quality programs staffed by skilled and dedicated professionals, which is why we began offering assessor visits and increasing coaching to licensed afterschool programs to support a culture of quality and raise the bar for quality in the future.

As always, Vermont's youth were at the heart of our work and continued to inspire us. We witnessed firsthand the future leaders of Vermont step forward, their voices echoing through the halls of the State House and materializing in community-led initiatives that foster belonging, positive youth development, and further youth empowerment.

With an eye toward shaping the future, Vermont Afterschool conducted a 5-month planning process to develop a multi-year strategic direction, foster meaningful relationships, and cultivate champions to advance the strategy and expand the network. The process included board and staff self-assessments, a visioning retreat, and a partner forum with 40 constituents, partners, staff, and board.

Using our values of Belonging & Inclusion, Youth Voice & Choice, and Advocacy & Allyship as our guideposts, Vermont Afterschool's multi-year strategic plan is designed to cultivate a more supportive and inclusive environment for young people in Vermont, promoting their growth and success while strengthening communities and fostering positive social outcomes statewide.

STRATEGY

The longer-term intended impact of Vermont Afterschool's strategic plan includes a future where youth are recognized and championed for their leadership across various sectors of the community; where young people have abundant opportunities for success in school, work, and life, supported by VTA and its partners' initiatives; and where Vermont achieves high rankings in happiness, wellness, career success, and financial stability, reflecting the positive impact of VTA's efforts on youth development and community well-being.

In 2024, Vermont took its biggest steps yet toward achieving Vermont Afterschool's vision of a state where every youth who wants to attend an afterschool and summer program has the opportunity to do so. With the passage of Act 78, the Agency of Education created a special fund "to be used to fund grant programs for the expansion of summer and afterschool programs with an emphasis on increasing access in underserved areas of the state."


The establishment of a special fund was not without legislative tension and debate, with some legislators in favor of instead distributing funds only to Local Education Agencies/schools. Thanks in part to testimony from Nicole Miller and many afterschool champions, the special fund was ultimately created, ensuring investment in a mixed delivery system of public, private, and nonprofit programs.

UNIVERSAL AFTERSCHOOL

In May, the Agency of Education awarded \$3.5 million in grant funding to 16 supervisory unions and nonprofits in 11 Vermont counties. This funding was in addition to the \$1.9 million in Room for Me expansion grants Vermont Afterschool distributed, which added 1,171 new afterschool slots.

Thanks to the passion, dedication, and efforts of Vermont's afterschool champions—in and out of Montpelier—we are well on our way to ensuring that youth in every Vermont community are able to benefit from the power of afterschool and summer learning programs.

Changemaking is an uphill climb. But there are people there to support you—like Vermont Afterschool—to ask you, 'what do you want the top of the mountain to look like?' In 2023 and 2024, Vermont Afterschool has been working in Barre, Bennington, Cabot, Rutland, and Franklin County to establish and strengthen local coalitions, organize youth councils, and support the councils and coalitions through a process to build an environment that embraces positive youth development and create more youth-friendly community spaces. With a focus on amplifying as many youth voices as possible, the Vermont Youth Project has succeeded thus far in creating youth-driven initiatives such as a teen gym in Bennington, a teen lounge in Barre, a teen space in Cabot, and a teen center in Rutland.


Equally as important, Vermont's youth have felt empowered and heard.

Vermont Afterschool continued its work in support of Vermont's 28-member State Youth Council. Now in its second year, the historic, second-in-the-nation council delivered its first set of **Recommendations on Policies that Impact Youths in Vermont** to Governor Scott, the Senate Committee on Government Operations, and the House Committee on Government Operations and Military Affairs, describing the moment as "a tremendous step for all Vermonters that opens a door of opportunity for many."

As the first terms for inaugural Council members end and the Council welcomes a new class of 14 members in the fall, we remain in awe of the power of youth voice, and excited to see the positive impact the Council will have on generations of Vermonters to come.



On March 9, 2024, Vermont Afterschool hosted 40 teams, 177 elementary, middle and high school students, and 1,000+ spectators at the Champlain Valley Expo for the 16th Annual Jr Iron Chef VT, a career exploration program that teaches communication, teamwork, and problem-solving skills, and culminates one day a year when youth from across the state are brought together to stand side-by-side in an orchestrated frenzy—dicing, grating, sifting, and sautéing their way to culinary fame.

Jr Iron Chef VT is truly a recipe for empowering youth.



We continued our efforts to strengthen Vermont's out-of-school programs and professionals through trainings, workshops, field forums, quality coaching and technical assistance, leadership and networking opportunities, and the promotion of best practices, because we know an investment in youth workers is an investment in young people. In FY24, we offered 110 workshops to 1,073 afterschool and youth-serving program staff, covering topics such as Creating a Culture of Youth Voice, the Seven Essential Life Skills, Youth Mental Health First Aid, and Redefining Resilience.


In November 2023, 175 third-space directors, staff, educators, and partners gathered for our 14th annual conference! The 2-day event began with a half-day deep-dive workshop with Lana Hailemariam from StandUP entitled "Reimagining Bias: Brave Conversations." Friday featured four hours of professional development on a wide-range of topics, an inspiring keynote from Lana, and a day-long celebration of Vermont's afterschool and summer learning professionals.




In November 2023, Vermont Afterschool began offering assessor visits to licensed afterschool programs for the revised STARS model through SPARQS (System for Program Access to Resources for Quality Supports). The goal of these visits is to support a culture of quality in licensed afterschool programs in Vermont by offering feedback to inform afterschool programs' continuous quality improvement plans and raise the bar for quality. Upon completion of the assessment, programs are offered continuous support through direct technical assistance and consultation, resources, training, coaching, and mentoring. In the program's first year, Vermont Afterschool assessed 41 programs in 12 counties.
